Pet Homelessness and Rescue







What is animal rescue?

- Animal rescue groups are organizations dedicated to saving animals from situations of neglect, abuse, homelessness or other unsafe situations
- There are many different types of rescue groups including animal sanctuaries and wildlife rehabilitators
- Today we will talk about domesticated pets like cats and dogs



Why are they homeless?



There are many different reasons an animal can become homeless:

- Born stray
- Family surrendered (moved, allergies, couldn't care for, no longer wanted, etc.)
- Owner has passed away
- Gets lost, owner not found

Homeless animals might be:

- A stray indefinitely if they are not found or caught
- Taken to a local animal shelter to be rehomed
- Caught by an animal rescue group to be adopted
- Picked up by Animal control
- Euthanized due to illness, behavior or overcrowded shelters



What is an animal shelter?









Q: How many people does it take to help an animal get adopted?

A: At least 10 people or more! That's a lot!

And YOU can be one of them...

Q: How quickly can cats multiply in one year?

A: An unspayed female can produce about 12 offspring per year. Wow!



MEET BUTTONS




She loves treats and napping in sunny spots. Unfortunately, Buttons' family did not have her spayed (a safe surgery to make sure she doesn't have any more kittens).


Solve the word problems to see how many kittens can come from just one unspayed cat like Buttons in a year.























Activity

Cathmatics: Answers

Will it be easy to find homes for all these kittens? What could Buttons' family have done to prevent so many kittens from being born that they were not able to care for?

Not likely.

They could have spayed the females and neutered the males.







This chart represents one unspayed female, her mate and all of her offspring, producing 2 litters















By spaying and neutering just one male and one female cat, more than 2,000 unwanted births can be prevented in just four years - and more than 2 million in 8 years!





Q: What can we do to help?

A: A lot, actually! Just by learning about the problem of animal homelessness and over population, you are already making a difference and part of the solution.

Go YOU! Let's see exactly what can be done...

Urgent Needs for Shelters & Rescues

- Time (from employees and volunteers)
 - Administrative work
 - Cleaning
 - Spending time with the animals, helping them socialize
 - Working adoption events and adoption appointments
- Physical supplies & Resources
 - Food
 - Shelter
 - Vet care
 - Toys, treats and activities for enrichment and socialization

Money

- To pay employees
- For building/property where the animals stay
- For vet care
- To buy supplies for the animals and the office
- To help with marketing (spreading awareness about the animals needing adopting and letting families know your organization exists)

Take Action Projects

Educate

Prevention education (Microchips, spay/neuter

Affordable vet care and clinics

Responsible Pet Ownership

Help families who want to keep their pet, but may be temporarily struggling to provide for them

Donate

Collect donations (money and/or supplies)

Adopt

If your family is ready to welcome a new pet, choose adoption over purchasing (avoiding pet stores, puppy mills, etc.). Can even "foster to adopt" to help find a good long term fit.

Foster

Temporarily take care of an animal in your home while they are waiting to be adopted

Volunteer

At or with a shelter

Reading programs

Transporting (no long term commitment)

Take Action Projects

For Our Troop

Continue to educate ourselves
Collect donations (money and/or supplies)

Get involved at a shelter (volunteering, reading programs, event help, etc.)

For Our Community

Enacting public policies to protect animal welfare

Adopt don't shop

Responsible Pet Ownership Education

Educating the public about pet homelessness and ways to reduce it




Thinking of creative new ways to reduce pet homelessness - What ideas can you think of?



Common Supplies Needed By Rescues & Shelters

- Clean towels and blankets
- Leads, leashes, and collars
- Unopened pet food and treats (canned and dry)
- Paper towels
- Clean newspapers
- Disinfecting wipes
- Cat litter
- Cage scratchers for cats
- Cat toys
- Kong toys
